Today's Readings

Have you ever noticed that in radio and TV interviews where an issue of national importance is being discussed the language of 'seeing' and 'hearing' is often used to describe understanding, compassion and insight? E.g. "I see it this way.." "what I hear you saying is..."; in this sense, sight has as much to do with seeing beneath the surface of things as it has to do with being able to recognise persons or objects in a physical sense. In other words, truly 'seeing' goes deeper than surface realities. In the same way truly 'hearing' often demands going beyond the surface meaning of words used to the deeper reality they point towards. Language like this appeals to the listeners to 'hear' in order to 'see' and understand.

Today's three readings are all linked by an appeal to these two senses of hearing and sight. John 'saw' another angel and 'heard' how many were sealed. He 'saw' a huge number of people and 'heard' their shouts of praise. Again in his first letter, John uses language to appeal to the imaginations of those who would read his letter. He asks them to think about the love God lavishes on them in order for them to better 'see' who they really are: children of God. By seeing more clearly, they will then model their lives more closely on Christ's in order to come one day into the fullness of reality in heaven.

The Gospel ties all this together beautifully by opening with three simple yet powerful words: 'seeing the crowds'. By 'seeing' Matthew meant that Jesus looks at them with powerful compassion and insight. He sees into their hearts and he recognises then need they have for encouragement and hope. He also wants them - and by extension - us to recognise that blessedness belongs to those who are faithful in the ordinary circumstances of their daily lives. Blessedness is part and parcel of the lives of those who are humble, gentle, compassionate, just, generous, peaceful and willing to sacrifice for the good of others. This is the path to sanctity.

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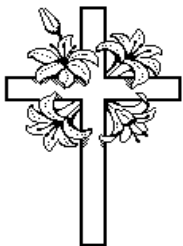
Week 31 of Year 1

1st November Feast of All Saints

2nd November Commemoration of all of the Faithful Departed

Wednesday 4th November St Charles Borromeo Bishop and Cardinal.

In 1560, aged 22, and not yet a priest, he was appointed Cardinal and administrator of the vacant see of Milan by his uncle Pope Pius IV. He took an important part in the Council of Trent. He was ordained priest in 1563, and made bishop and archbishop of Milan the following year. He went on to reform his diocese, to found 'Sunday schools' to remedy people's religious ignorance and open seminaries. During the plague of 1576 he worked tirelessly for his people.



Month of the Holy Souls

Today is the Feast of all Saints and tomorrow is 'All Souls day'. The purpose of these feasts is to remember those who

have died, whether they are officially recognised by the church as saints or not. Together they are a celebration of the 'Communion of Saints'.

During November, the Month of the Holy Souls, Mass is offered daily for the repose of the souls entered on the November Lists.
